Bridgette Stasher-Booker, Ph.D. RHIA, CHTS-IM, a native of Mississippi, and currently serves as Associate Professor and Chair of Alabama State University's Health Information Management Program.

She is a graduate of Mississippi College, with a Bachelor's of Science degree in Political Science. She received her Master's degree from Jackson State University in History and has a Doctoral degree in Public Policy and Administration with an emphasis in Policy Analysis also from Jackson State University. In 2016, Booker received the College of Health Science Faculty of the Year Award. Currently, she is a Langston University Fellow. She served as Chair of the Diabetes Coalition of Mississippi (DCM) and in 2010, she was selected and honored as one of Mississippi's50 Leading Business Women.

As Chair Dr. Booker's seeks to build a competitive program that produces knowledgeable and skillful students who are industry ready. We are progressively re-engineering our image to become a premier academic program. We are the only undergraduate health information program in the state. Her responsibilities include leading courses in the analysis and system design, electronic health record, information technology, management, research, coding, quality assurance, and finance. She also assist with the coordination of academic accreditation standards and curriculum development.

She is a certified Supervisory Manager and Electronic Health Record Implementation Manager. Additionally, she holds certificates in team building, HIPPA Privacy, Security and Health Information Exchange, as a workflow analysis and redesign specialist, Diabetes Self-Management Trainer and Chronic Disease Self-Management Facilitator.

In her previous role, she served as a Clinical Application Coordinator with the Department of Health and Human Services, Indian Health Services in Sisseton South Dakota. She also worked for the Mississippi Department of Medicaid as a Staff Officer III in the Office of Managed Care.
